


This Month's Trivia: Manzanita



Common name for Arctostaphylos which are slow growing evergreen shrubs found from British Columbia, Western United States into Mexico, especially in areas of poor soil and little water. The size of the 105 species range in size from ground hugging to 20 feet tall. Best characterized by its slow decaying smooth orange or reddish-brown colored bark and its stiff, twisting branches. Manzanita has attractive blooms in the winter into early spring with berries on the branches in spring and summer. Most species have flowers and berries that are edible.

Manzanita has many uses. Manzanita berries have been mashed and made into a cider to use to treat stomach ailments, bronchitis, kidney ailments and promote appetite. Berries have also been used as a thickener or sweetener in some dishes. Or eaten alone. Manzanita leaves used in different ways have been used for treating poison oak rash, mild urinary tract infections, diarrhea, common colds, stomach cramps and to treat open sores. Manzanita are ornamental plants used in gardens and along highways especially in Oregon and Washington. Manzanita is also very popular for decorative uses such as for weddings, by floral arrangers, in aquariums and for bird perches. If manzanita is cleaned and cured properly, the wood is resistant to leaching of the tannins into the water. Also, manzanita wood is used for burning since the wood is dense and burns at high temperatures for long periods of time. During World War II, manzanita root burls were made into smoking pipes when the imported briar was unavailable. In the sunlight, the dark manzanita wood smooths and bleaches white or light gray color. The unusual branching of manzanita gives it the nickname of "mountain driftwood".
